LETTER FROM BRYAN WILSON

City of Reading Council Members,

My name is Bryan Wilson. I live at 236 Bernard Avenue. I’m very excited for the business opportunities that have been presented to our city but as a resident that will be directly affected by the increase in traffic to this specific area I would like to voice a few concerns.

When the Riesenbergs extension project was nearing completion just a few short years ago Sabrina Smith and I addressed council to voice our concerns over the potential increase in semi-truck traffic. Our concerns were that the truck traffic would be a huge nuisance to the area, it would damage the newly constructed road much quicker, and that this kind of traffic wasn’t ideal for a road parallel to little league sports fields. Council’s rebuttals were that the traffic would only be during “normal” business hours, there wouldn’t be enough traffic to damage the road, and that we only had concerns for this because we lived “right there.” Since our concerns were presented Riesenbergs has needed 2 patch jobs completed, the telephone pole on the corner of our property has been struck 3 times (that we’re aware of) by semi-trucks coming down Bernard turning right onto Riesenbergs, the stop sign next to this pole was struck and completely knocked down by a semi-truck turning left onto Bernard from Riesenbergs, the little league sports were moved to different fields throughout the city (and other neighboring cities) to accommodate the truck traffic, and the traffic has been 24/7 (we have as much video proof as you need if you’re skeptical). As I’m writing this email (11/9 at 5:00pm)

a dump truck just ran the stop sign right in front of a Reading Police Officer. If that's not enough, a semi-truck then proceeded to run the stop sign right in front of a Reading Police Officer. Both vehicles were indeed pulled over.

As I stated before, we are absolutely excited for the new business opportunities but we would like the city to truly consider rerouting the semi-truck traffic to a street other than Riesenber Ave. During the Neyer/Port presentation the presenters were not even aware of Landy Lane as an option for this traffic, which was very disappointing to learn. The plans for the Riesenber Extension project displayed a sign at the corner of Columbia & Riesenber that stated "No Trucks Over 3 Axles." This sign was never installed and I've personally never heard the reason why the city decided to go against these plans. During the Riesenber extension project Mr. Tony Gertz mentioned Cavett Dr. on multiple occasions. I believe this new project is a perfect opportunity to have the bridges redone on Cavett Dr. to access the potential business area. The Neyer/Port representatives mentioned that there are many grant opportunities for projects such as this. The city was able to obtain a \$300,000 loan (at 0% interest) for the Riesenber Extension so I am sure there are many options available to ease the financial burden of a project like this.

Please consider these concerns of relocating the semi traffic away from the residential areas and onto a more appropriate route.

COUNCIL COMMITTEE REPORTS

FINANCE: Anthony Gertz

- Confident we're still way behind than what we hoped we have due to the virus. Revenue will be less than the 5% ahead we predicted last year. Sabrina reported we collected \$575,000.00 October 18,000 refunds so we've collected about \$558,000.00.

UTILITIES, LANDS & BUILDINGS: Don Lindeman

ZONING, PLANNING & ENVIRONMENT: Dave Powell

- Construction continues on the Amberley Village North Site where they are constructing the Lewis Animal Hospital. Last week around 6:30 PM there was a contractor saw cutting expansion joints in concrete. They were using a leaf blower to clean the dust send a cloud of concrete dust onto Maple Drive on a warm evening when people likely had their windows open.

Tonight they were still drilling and compacting geopiers at 6:15 PM

I contacted Amberley Village administrators and reminded them of their past assurances that they are going to be good neighbors to the citizens of Reading that live next to the North site.

I was contacted by a constituent about a parking issue at the top of Maple Drive. I contacted the Safety Service Director who provided me a copy of the ordinance that set the 3 foot distance from driveways. I went back and watched the council meeting where it passed to listen to the discussion. I have been observing the situation since I have been contacted and will give an update once I have completed my due diligence.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY: Randy Fischesser

For Police:

- Hit skip auto accident E. Columbia Ave. at Hunt Rd. with a lady and her dog struck. Personnel have followed up on numerous leads, with negative results at this time. Pictures of suspect vehicle have been posted in the news media and social media.
- W. Columbia Ave at Reading Rd., Stolen vehicle recovered with female arrested for having possession of the vehicle.
- Traffic stop at Reading and Galbraith. Driver arrested for trafficking drugs (crack and fentanyl)
- While investigating, for a breaking and entering from 11/02/2020. A suspect was developed and an attempt to buy the items back resulted in the recovery of more than \$7000.00 in stolen item from the breaking and entering case. Suspect arrested and transported to HCJC.
- Department has received a grant from the Attorney General's Office for Bullet Proof Vests. The grant will cover more than \$13,000.00 of cost.
- Department is planning its Shop with a Cop Program for 2020. All pending COVID restrictions.

For the Fire/EMS:

- There is an ordinance on the agenda this evening for the purchase of a Lucas CPR device. This has been approved by the committee and previously discussed by council. Since I got this out so late, we can make this a first read only if council prefers.
- Patrick will be sharing exact figures and the city's response to the current Covid spike. However, I will say that cases have increased drastically over the past couple of weeks. I encourage everyone to continue taking the recommended precautions of wearing a mask, washing your hands and social distancing. Just doing these 3 things will help curb the spread drastically.
- I have invited Chief Owens to be our guest speaker at the December 1st meeting. He will be discussing an ambulance purchase/changeover planned for next year.

- Do NOT park in front of leaves – Service Department will not pick them up.

- The field house is closed until further notice due to Covid. It was decided Because Reading Schools went to remote learning and no sports. VYO followed the School's lead and the administration felt that we should shut down the field house, including the adult events.
