CALL TO ORDER

President Mr. Mattscheck called the meeting to order at 7:30 PM.

INVOCATION AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

President Mr. Mattscheck led those in attendance in a prayer and then the Pledge of Allegiance.

ROLL CALL

Council Members Present: Mr. Powell, Mr. Bronner, Mr. Bishop, Mr. Boehner, Mrs. Kroeger, Mr. Thamann & Mrs. Eadicicco.

MOTION TO AMEND AGENDA TO WITHDRAW THE RESOLUTION: Mr. Thamann motioned, Mr. Powell seconded, carried by 7-0 roll call vote.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: None

AUDIENCE ASKING PARTICIPATION:

(1) Ms. Emily Howell, former Reading Police Officer shared her thoughts and feedback on the police report stating that officers have brought multiple complaints and concerns to Mayor Bemmes and offered to answer questions from council. Mayor Bemmes acknowledged that officers have brought complaints to him over the years and clarified that his previous comments were related to not having heard from residents about the issue. Mr. Thamann asked for specifics on the situation in the police department and Ms. Howell stated that there have been multiple grievances filed by officers over the years. Mr. Mattscheck asked how accurate the report is and whether Ms. Howell had been interviewed, and she confirmed that it's accurate and that she was interviewed. Mr. Powell asked about the resolution of the grievances that had been filed, and Ms. Howell did not have details to provide. Mr. Chris Bundren, former Reading Police Officer approached the podium unannounced and shared his thoughts on the police retention issues, which Mayor Bemmes responded to, and Council President Mattscheck stopped the exchange as it was not in line with council rules.

(2) Mr. Bob Ashbrock asked whether the December 16 ODOT meeting was confirmed and asked when details would be posted for residents to review prior to the meeting. Mayor Bemmes responded that ODOT had not yet provided the information. Council President Mattscheck confirmed that the ODOT Reading Road Project is still tentatively scheduled for December 16 at 7:30pm at council chambers. Mayor Bemmes confirmed he would follow up with ODOT for the information.

COMMUNICATIONS:

(1) Ohio Division of Liquor Control: Notice asking if we request a hearing for the transfer of the "Don Vonderhaars Market & Catering Inc" to the " Marutinandan Liquor, LLC, Vonderhaars Market." No council members requested a hearing so Council President Mattscheck stated that he would turn it over to Police Chief Edens to review.

COUNCIL COMMITTEE REPORTS:

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FINANCE: Andy Bronner

I would like to give more information about the 3 Ordinances on the agenda tonight to purchase equipment for the Fire Department.

The first Ordinance is for an expenditure not to exceed \$281,147.90 for the purchase of replacement Self Contained Breathing Apparatus equipment. This will be made from the Fire/EMS Capital Improvement Fund. Once the equipment is received, a reimbursement from the Department of Homeland Security, Assistance to Firefighters Grant program of \$267,759.90 will be given to the City and deposited in the same account. The City's required 5% contribution for this equipment will total \$13,388.00.

The second Ordinance is for the purchase of a replacement breathing air compressor and Cascade system. This expenditure will also be made from the Fire/EMS Capital Improvement Fund for an amount not to exceed \$60,800.00.

The third Ordinance is for the purchase of Battery Powered Rescue Tool equipment. This expenditure, not to exceed \$54,700, will be made from the 2401 Fire Grant Fund. A reimbursement from the Ohio Bureau of Workers Compensation in the amount of \$40,000 makes the City's contribution for this equipment \$14,700.

I know Mrs. Kroeger is going to give a more detailed report, but I wanted to give an update on the Crosden report regarding our police department.

I'll admit when I first read the report it was upsetting, and I thought there were some serious issues with our police department and our police chief that needed to be addressed.

After finding out more information and speaking with several officers, both past officers and officers still with our department, I have learned that not all officers within our department and not all officers mentioned in the report that have left were interviewed. Because of this I feel that the report lacks information and I cannot in good faith say that this is a thorough and accurate report of our police department. Given the amount of money that was spent, I'm disappointed to say the least.

The officers that I have spoken to are seasoned officers and have many, many years on the force. Many have worked at several other departments, so they have a good perspective on how different departments in different sized cities are run. I feel that their opinions are valuable and should have been included. I found no glaring complaints either with the department or the chief. That's not to say that there couldn't be some policy changes and some other minor changes and that everything is perfect, but it shows that this investigation does not show the whole truth.

Also, after reading the report again, I noticed that it comes off very directed towards our chief and very general with any other leadership. I'm not throwing anyone under the bus, I'm just mentioning that the way the report is written, it comes off as targeted.

I also noticed that city council is mentioned in the report as though we agree, however no one on city council was interviewed as part of this investigation and I feel as though they spoke for us. This, too, I found very disappointing.

Another issue I have with the report is that it comes off very vague. When the report says there's an issue with leadership; I want the leadership defined. Who exactly is being referenced? The report says "the chief of police" in some paragraphs but

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then says “command staff” in others. Who’s included in this reference? Also, if there is an issue or something that happened, they should have given an example. Explain in the report exactly what happened. I want specifics.

I know there are some questions about how this report was paid for by the city and I believe that Mrs. Kroeger will touch on that, and Mrs. Smith can explain it further. I do feel that for \$26,000 total, we did not get what we paid for.

I also want to say that for those who believe this was swept under the rug, we are taking this very seriously. This is why I believe that speaking to as many officers as possible is imperative.

There were also no nefarious deeds regarding payment. I want to remind everyone that the city is audited quite often, and Mrs. Smith does a fantastic job with our financials. It’s my understanding that we have passed those audits with flying colors.

That said, I do wish that council had been informed that this investigation was taking place so we wouldn’t have been caught off guard. However, what’s done is done and hopefully in the future we can expect better communication.

Again, I want to reiterate that we are taking this report seriously, however I am disappointed with what I have learned after it was released. I’m still open to talking to any officers, past and present, who would like their voices heard.

I want to take a few minutes to address the recent report regarding conditions inside the Reading Police Department and to share what I have learned through my own conversations with our officers.

First, the report states that interviews were conducted with nearly every patrol officer, supervisory staff member, and city leadership official. However, from the information I have, patrol officers with fewer than five years of service were not interviewed. That means a significant portion of our newer officers—who have firsthand experience with today's culture and leadership dynamic—were not included in the feedback. In addition, no council members were interviewed, despite statements in the report suggesting that council "observed" significant changes in leadership style. Since no one on council was asked for input, those statements cannot be verified.

The findings of the report do point to a breakdown in leadership, but it is important to clarify that this is not limited to the Chief. The term "command staff" includes lieutenants, and much of the tension, resistance to change, and internal conflict appears to be occurring at that level. The report highlights fragmented leadership and a lack of consistent, value-based direction within the department.

Between 2020 and 2025, sixteen officers left the Reading Police Department. Eleven of those departures were attributed to dissatisfaction with leadership and the internal work environment. Others left for higher-paying departments, to be closer to home, because of disability, disciplinary issues, or because they preferred a department with fewer calls for service. Only one of the sixteen officers who left was a lifelong resident of Reading.

It is also important to understand the role of the Ohio DROP Program. DROP allows officers nearing retirement to lock in their pension benefits. Because an officer's pension is based on their salary when they enter DROP, many officers transfer to higher-paying departments beforehand to maximize their retirement income. This is not unique to Reading—and it explains part of the turnover we've seen.

Over the last few weeks, I have spoken with many of our officers directly. While there are concerns, there were also several positive things said about our department. Officers told me they feel well-paid and well-treated. One officer even said our staff is "spoiled" compared to surrounding agencies. They described the department as fair, kind, respectful, and professional. We should not overlook these positive reflections.

But I also heard consistent concerns. Several officers shared that the negativity inside the department begins not with patrol staff, but with certain lieutenants. There is a mentality of "this is the way it's always been done," which makes it difficult to move forward. Some officers believe that complaints about leadership are being encouraged or influenced by lieutenants, particularly among newer officers. Many told me the opinions about the Chief are more personal than professional, stemming

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from contention when the chief's position was filled. And I heard repeatedly that lieutenants, not the Chief, have the greatest impact on morale because they are the ones interacting directly with patrol officers day to day.

Another issue raised in the report involves department-wide meetings. The last full department meeting occurred about 15 years ago. Scheduling remains difficult because of staffing demands and a lack of willingness among some officers to adjust schedules. The same challenge applies to training. Officers have requested double time to attend training on their days off. While I agree compensation is appropriate, double time is simply not financially feasible for the city—just as it isn't feasible in many other public-sector professions.

What has become clear to me is this: some members of the department are very focused on removing the Chief, instead of focusing on the long-term health and future of the department. Until the internal culture shifts—from resistance and division to collaboration and accountability—these issues will continue no matter who is chief.

I have also spoken at length with Chief Edens. He acknowledges that there are things he needs to improve, and he has already begun working on those areas. That willingness to grow is important, but it will mean very little if the rest of the leadership team does not also commit to change.

This department needs unity, not factions. It needs collaboration, not personal agendas. And it needs leadership at every level—from Chief to lieutenant to patrol officer—to remember who they serve: the citizens of Reading.

In every profession, whether you are a teacher, a bus driver, a janitor, or a police officer, you will work with people you may not always agree with. But professionalism means putting those differences aside and focusing on the mission. Our police department must do the same.

It is time to stop tearing each other down from the inside and start preparing for the future. Reading deserves a strong, stable police force—one built on teamwork, respect, and shared accountability. That is the direction we must push toward, and it will take every member of the department to get there.

- City crews have been cleaning catch basin tops during recent rains.
